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Native Perennials for Form & Function

Gardening is undergoing a revolution. Originally seen as beautification, we now know that our residential landscapes are key in providing for local wildlife and restoring our local ecosystems. Once thought of as fussy and high maintenance, perennial plantings offer more than colorful blooms: they're some of the strongest players in providing for wildlife, boosting biodiversity, and creating beautiful low-maintenance spaces for us to enjoy. —Thursday, January 31st, Mid-afternoon

Driving west out of Pickens on Hwy 183, I pass by the huge, but today deserted, Pickens County Flea Market. In less than a half mile, I make a couple turns going south and two buildings sitting close together on a rise in the distance come into view. Jon had mentioned earlier, "The one with the gable roof is my house. Turn in the second driveway, which is a newer one and not quite finished."

I was making the trip out to interview Jon Fritz, thinking, *"I cannot improve* on what he has so succinctly written in the paragraph describing his presentation. *I'm going because I feel compelled to meet the person who wrote it."* After arriving at his place and meeting Jon, I knew that I had made the right decision.

Turning in, I park and exit my car. Immediately I relish Jon's view of Six Mile Mountain, maybe three miles away, well visible over the rooftops of his neighbors' houses that are a comfortable distance away. Just a few feet away are several stands of short and tall grassy plants. Raised beds are methodically located on two sides of the house. Beyond the beds is a small field of golden broomsedge bluestem waving in the afternoon breeze.

Jon lives, works, and thrives on a single-acre plot of land that he bought in 2015 from a man who originally purchased the property at a tax sale. As he worked for months tearing down the old doublewide on the property — but *saving* all the windows for his future greenhouse — he was getting certified in permaculture design.

"Exactly what is permaculture design?" I ask.

"There are many definitions of it. It came about in the 60's and 70's... It's a design philosophy that hinges on arranging components so that the waste of one element goes into feeding the other element in an effort so that people can exist in their ecosystem as one unit. So, basically, "permanent culture" is where it comes from. It's the idea that, if we can fill every niche of our plantings with things that we can use, we basically create an artificial ecosystem that operates functionally like an ecosystem — naturally — but also provides for us, and we can fit into that ecosystem, too, without tearing up the soil every year and doing annual beds like I do. It's a self-sustainability endeavor that's been around for forty-some

years now, but everyone that studies it admits that it's all very much a learning process still, even for the masters.

"Fortunately I was taking that course at the same time that I had bought this property so I designed it using permaculture principles. It's designed based on concentric circles, based on the hierarchy of input. So, Zone I is the house because you spend the most time there. Zone 2 is stuff around the house you'll tend to more often like the raised beds, the herbs, etc., you'll go to several times a week. Then Zone 3 you step out to a larger circle where you might have your hands in it once a week. Then I have an oval-shaped driveway that wraps all the way around my property that defines that. You can't see that much on this side because I've got many of my vegetable beds out there, but on the other side, that whole half of the property is functional plants, mostly food crops of various kinds and fruit trees and shrubs. So that's how it's laid out, with the house in the center and the concentric circle rings outside of that."

As Jon gives me a tour in Zones 1 and 2, he explains how he uses his property.

"This is not like anything I would design for a customer because there's one of everything. It works for me partially because I use it as my laboratory space so that I can try out new things that I've never planted before... 'Oh! I've never bought this before'... so I stick it in the ground and see what it does.

"One of my themes here is — it's a bit 'Darwinesque' — it either sinks or it swims. I'm replicating in these beds and in my treatment of the beds and of the plants individually what the average homeowner is going to do. I'm not going to 'baby' any plant because I know my customers are not going to 'baby' their plants. And if they don't do well, I'll say, 'Well, maybe I put them in the wrong spot.' So I may try a second time in a spot what I've learned about this plant and try it again. Patrick McMillan says the same thing. He says, 'Kill it once, try it one more time; kill it again, don't bother.' So I give it a second chance in a different place in a different condition. Once you learn about what it does, you can find a place that may be more suitable for it."

The "brief" 20-minute interview that I had planned is now over an hour and we have barely touched on perennials...

"So Jon, what is one of your favorite perennials?"

"I'm glad you asked... [Laughter] My friends say, When Jon walks around his yard he says, 'Everything is his favorite!""

Jon points to a tall airy plant...

"Here is probably one of my most favorite... rattlesnake-master (Eryngium yuccifolium). I just think it's so 'theatrical.' Its structure lasts all season, all winter. It puts up these flower stalks in late summer into late July and into August. They're blue-green... you can see the coloration down here in the foliage. It will have these little tiny, tiny cream-colored blooms on them — not super colorful. But it's the structure that's most interesting." — Steve Marlow

After graduation, he worked as a Wildfire Effects Monitor in the southern plains states, where he was inspired by the natural beauty and diversity of prairie ecosystems. Home to the Rocky Shoals Spider Lilies




