<i>Aesculus pavia</i>	Red buckeye	1	blooms in time for migrating hummingbirds' arrival
<i>Aronia abutifolia</i>	Red chokeberry	3	good fall color with long lasting berries
<i>Cephalanthus occidentalis</i>	Buttonbush	3	fragrant flowers are pollinator magnets
<i>Conradina glabra</i>	Wild rosemary, False Rosemary	1	long bloom season and grows in sandy soils
<i>Cornus alternifolia</i>	Pagoda dogwood	V	showy, fragrant flowers, attracts birds and butterflies, good fall color
<i>Cornus sp.</i>	Dogwood	1	
<i>Cyrilla parvifolia</i>	Littleleaf Titi	V	Coastal Plain plant
<i>Euonymus americanus</i>	Strawberry bush	3	showy fruits (Hearts-a-bustin')
<i>Gordonia lasianthus</i>	Loblolly bay	3	Coastal Plain plant, fragrant flowers
<i>Hydrangea arborescens</i>	Smooth hydrangea	3	host plant for hydrangea sphinx moth
<i>Hydrangea quercifolia</i>	Oakleaf hydrangea	V	huge white flowers and excellent fall color
<i>Lyonia lucida</i>	Fetterbush	3	cute, bell-shaped flowers in spring; glossy leaves; coastal plain plant
<i>Quercus sp.</i>	Assorted oaks		
<i>Quercus prinoides</i>	Dwarf Chinquapin Oak	V	an oak for small spaces! Excellent for wildlife
<i>Vaccinium elliotii</i>	Elliott's blueberry	3	edible berries, Coastal Plain plant, red fall color
<i>Viburnum dentatum</i>	Arrowwood	3	berries good for birds
<b>Azaleas</b>			
<i>Rhododendron arboescens</i>	Sweet azalea	3	showy fragrant flowers, recommended for northern SC
<i>Rhododendron atlanticum</i>	Coastal azalea	3	grows in sandy soils
<i>Rhododendron colemanii</i>	Red Hills azalea	3	discovered in Alabama and Georgia, but will grow in SC
<i>Rhododendron flammeum</i>	Oconee azalea	3	grows in sandy soils, orange flowers
<b>Vines</b>			
<i>Gelsemium sempervirens</i>	Carolina Jasmine	1	blooming now, it is the State flower of SC!
<b>Perennials</b>			
<i>Aquilegia canadensis</i>	Columbine	1	early plant to provide nectar in the spring for pollinators; deer resistant
<i>Asclepias incarnata</i>	Swamp Milkweed	1	
<i>Asclepias perennis</i>	Aquatic milkweed	1	host plant for monarch butterfly, nectar plant for all pollinators
<i>Ampelaster carolinus</i>	Climbing aster	1	
<i>Baptisia alba</i>	Wild white indigo	1	
<i>Conradina glabra</i>	False Rosemary	1	rare, Sandhills plant, shrubby
<i>Coreopsis delphinifolia</i>	Larkspur tickseed	1	grows primarily in GA and SC in dry soils. Very dainty
<i>Coreopsis integrifolia</i>	Chipola River coreopsis	1	rare, grows in moist to wet soils
<i>Dryopteris ludoviciana</i>	Southern wood fern	1	
<i>Dyschoriste oblongifolia</i>	Twinflower	1	long bloom season, sandhills plant
<i>Eryngium aquaticum</i>	Marsh Rattlesnake master	1	rattlesnake master for wet areas, host plant for caterpillars that like the carrot family
<i>Eryngium yuccifolium</i>	Rattlesnake Master	1	will grow in dry soils, excellent for pollinators
<i>Erythrina herbacea</i>	Coralbean	3	shrubby; showy, red, tubular flowers followed by bright red beans. Really cool plant!
<i>Fragaria virginiana</i>	native strawberry	1	small edible berries, host plant for gray hairstreak butterfly
<i>Helianthus angustifolia</i>	Swamp sunflower	1	sunflower for wet areas
<i>Helianthus floricidus</i>	Florida sunflower	1	grows well in our part of the country
<i>Hibiscus coccineus</i>	Scarlet hibiscus	1	huge red flowers over long bloom period
<i>Hypericum densiflorum v. interior</i>	St. John's Wort	1	
<i>Liatis spicata</i>	Dense Blazing Star	1	attracts birds and butterflies and tolerant of summer heat and humidity
<i>Lobelia siphilitica</i>	Great blue lobelia	1	for wet soils, nice blue flowers in late summer
<i>Mitchella repens</i>	Partridge berry	1	dainty, creeping very low-growing evergreen
<i>Monarda fistulosa</i>	Bee Balm	1	popular, showy perennial, deer resistant, good for pollinators
<i>Monarda punctata</i>	Dotted horsemint	1	deer resistant, pollinator magnet
<i>Penstemon laevigatus</i>	Beardtongue	1	good for pollinators
<i>Phlox amoena</i>	Hairy phlox	1	
<i>Phlox divaricata</i>	Woodland phlox	1	blue flowers for shade garden
<i>Rudbeckia fulgida</i>	Black-eyed Susan	1	attracts pollinators and birds eat seeds in fall
<i>Rudbeckia lanciniata</i>	Cutleaf coneflower	1	
<i>Ruellia caroliniensis</i>	Wild petunia	1	will grow in dry sandy soil
<i>Senecio aurea</i>	Golden ragwort	1	also known as Packera aurea
<i>Sisyrinchium spp</i>	Blue-eyed grass	1	
<i>Sisyrinchium spp</i>	Purple-eyed grass	1	
<i>Solidago caesia</i>	Wreath goldenrod	1	smaller goldenrod good for shade, not aggressive
<i>Solidago odora</i>	Sweet goldenrod	1	relatively tall, but easily kept in bounds. Leaves smell like anise and can make tea from them.
<i>Stokesia laevis</i>	Stoke's aster	1	Basal leaves are evergreen, violet blue flowers 2.5 inches across.
<i>Symphotrichum cordifolium</i>	Blue wood aster	1	
<i>Vernonia angustifolia</i>	Ironweed	1	Native to Sandhills! Can reduce height of plant by cutting back stems in late spring. Great for butterflies and bees
<i>Yucca filamentosa</i>	Adam's Needle	1	evergreen and resistant to deer, rabbit, poor soil, drought and heat!
<i>Zephyranthes atamasca</i>	Atamasco Lily	1	early bloomer for moist, semi-shaded gardens
<i>Zizia aurea</i>	Golden Alexander	1	in the carrot family, so it is a host plant for Black swallowtail butterflies
